



Afghan Girl is a 1984 photographic portrait of Sharbat Gula taken by photojournalist Steve McCurry It appeared on the June 1985 cover of National Geographic. The image is of an adolescent girl with green eyes in a red headscarf looking intensely at the camera. She was a Pashtun child living in the Nasir Bagh refugee camp in Pakistan during the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan.

The photo became a symbol of Afghanistan.

Her photograph was taken by National Geographic Society photographer Steve McCurry, on <u>Kodachrome</u> 64 color <u>slide film</u>, with a <u>Nikon FM2</u> camera and <u>Nikkor</u> 105mm Ai-S F2.5















The eye of the beholder ...

Tracking the gaze whilst viewing an image of a face tells us what features are most focused on by a viewer of a portrait?

All of the image is important, but some parts are more important than others.

When you view portraits, stop to think where your eyes are drawn. What can you learn from this.

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Taking portraits ...

- Take lots of shots. "Film" is cheap!
- Catching the decisive moment
- Get the model used to the camera click and eventually they may forget you are there and relax – that is when you will get the best images.
